

Hydrant Flushing will begin on or about 05/01/2023.
Flushing will be done during the night time hours, between 10pm. to 6am. Our water system needs to be routinely rinsed out. This maintenance process contributes to the long-term health of our water system, and should present minimal inconvenience for our residents.

Subsequently, all of the fire hydrants and water mains in town will be flushed for a period of time. There may be a temporary decrease of water pressure while a main or hydrant is being flushed in a neighborhood. There may also be a slight discoloration to tap water during or following this process. If your water does become discolored, turn on an outside faucet to clear the water line before doing any laundry or cleaning.

FLOOD INFORMATION

Flooding occurs regularly in our area and, at times, can result in evacuations, damage to property, and injuries to individuals, including death. Those persons living near waterways or other low-lying areas are most at risk, but anyone in a community susceptible to flooding can be affected. Hazards range from potential flash flooding to water contamination due to broken gasoline or sewer lines. Below is some information that you might find helpful. TIPS FOR PROTECTING YOUR PROPERTY

- ♦ If your home is prone to flooding, move your furnace, water heater, and electric panel to higher floors.
- Install "check valves" in sewer traps to prevent water and sewer from backing up into your home.
- ♦ Waterproof your basement walls to stop seepage.
- Build barriers such as floodwalls or levees to keep out floodwater; have sandbags in storage to help divert water away from your structure.
- Store insurance policies, deeds, and other valuable records in a safe deposit box or other secure location.

DURING A FLOOD - DO THE FOLLOWING:

- ♦ Stay tuned to radio or TV for updates on storm.
- Watch for flash flooding. This can occur without rain clouds or rain in the immediate area.
- Avoid low-lying areas such as drainage channels / retention basins.
- Never walk through moving water more than 6 inches deep.
- Do not drive through flooded areas. Cars can be easily swept away in just two (2) feet of moving water.
- If your vehicle stalls in water, exit it, and move to higher ground.
- Evacuate your home if instructed by authorities and return home only when they say it's safe.

Finally, before the next flood event you are encouraged to <u>consider purchasing flood insurance through the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP)</u>.

Regular homeowner's insurance does not cover flood loses.

Single Stream Recycling

Single Stream Recycling (glass, plastic, paper, cardboard, aluminum cans etc.) We are all aware of the importance of recycling as one of the most important means to help preserve our world's resources.

Single stream recycling simply means residents can put all their recycling items into one container without sorting them into categories. The Morris County Municipal Utilities Authority (MCMUA) has partnered with Re-Community Recycling located in Mine Hill, New Jersey to provide Single Stream recycling to those municipalities who are serviced by the MCMUA.

There are many benefits to single stream recycling, some of which are listed below.

- Simplified recycling, as all recyclable materials are collected in one container, making collection easy and convenient. This typically increases the number of participants, tonnage collected, and material diverted from landfills.
- Reduced collection costs by using single-compartment trucks. These are cheaper to purchase and operate, they also allow for larger loads and fewer trips to the recycling center.
- Increased cleanliness as there is a decrease of loose materials blowing through the streets.
- No sorting of materials at the curb
- Recycling collection days can be reduced from the current Monday thru Wednesday collection every other week.
- There will be an increase in the list of items that will be accepted curbside that are currently not collected.
- Reduction in the number of vehicles used for collection, thereby reducing traffic, saving energy and will help to reduce greenhouse gases.
- By removing recyclables from the solid waste stream we will see a decrease in the amount of money paid for tonnage fees at the solid waste transfer station. The value of recycled materials can make a difference in the amount you pay for curbside garbage and recycling pickups. Therefore, in addition to the environmental benefit to you and your family there is a financial benefit as well.

How to Prevent Sewer Backups in Your Basement

With the recent flooding from Hurricane Irene and Tropical Storm Lee many people have experienced sewer backups in their homes. Sewerage backups and basement flooding can be caused by several factors. High amounts of rainfall and associated flooding can enter the sanitary drainage system causing the system to become overloaded and backup into your home or business. Backups can also be caused by events not related to storms or flooding. Individual service lines can be plugged by grease, waste, tree roots, and breaks in the pipes or saturated ground. Sewer mains in the street can also be plugged for similar reasons as well as vandalism or placement of illegal items into sewer system. In Dover, the property owner is responsible for the sewer lateral from the curb to the house while the town is responsible for the maintenance of the line from the curb to the main.

The sanitary drain lines are designed for bathroom and kitchen waste only. Connecting sump pumps and roof drains to the sewerage system is illegal and can cause overloading of the system resulting in backups and problems at the sewerage treatment plant. Proper maintenance such as having the line snaked or power jetted may help in certain situations. Certain plumbers are equipped with cameras that can be placed into the drain line which can help to determine the condition of the line and if there are any existing or potential problems with the line.

There are several ways to prevent backups. Although every business and residence is different, bathrooms, laundry facilities and open pipes below grade and at ground level are most susceptible to problems. Here are a few ways to avoid these types of problems:

- Be sure to install check valves on sump pumps and sewerage injector discharge pipes.
- Cap floor drains and open pipes in basements with screw plugs or rubber caps.
- Install a back water check valve on the main sanitary sewer lateral leaving the house. This will protect all piping and fixtures upstream of the valve from backing up due to a surcharged system.

The cost for taking these preventative measures varies greatly. Some simple fixes may cost as little as \$250 and some as much as \$3,000. As always, be prepared if you suspect you may have a problem and be proactive to protect your property and belongings. The cost to replace a finished basement or other rooms could cost much more to replace if damage is sustained.

This information is intended to provide residents and property owners with some information that may help to protect property from potential water and sewerage damages. It is not intended to replace the advice and guidance of an experienced professional given the various conditions that may be found in any given building or property.

Remember a few basic safety tips.

- Ground fires are not permitted.

- Never leave a fire unattended. A responsible

SAFETY TIPS

- >>> Propane and charcoal BBQ grills should only be used outdoors
- >>> The grill should be placed well away from the home, deck railings and out from under eaves and overhanging branches.
-))) Keep children and pets at least three feet away from the grill area
- Keep your grill clean by removing grease or fat buildup from the grills and in trays below the grill.
- Never leave your grill unattended.
-))) Always make sure your gas grill lid is open before liahtina it.

CHARCOAL GRILLS

-))) There are several ways to get the charcoal ready to use. Charcoal chimney starters allow you to start the charcoal using newspaper as a fuel
- If you use a starter fluid, use only charcoal starter fluid. Never add charcoal fluid or any other flammable liquids to the fire.
- >>> Keep charcoal fluid out of the reach of children and away from heat sources.
- There are also electric charcoal starters, which do not use fire. Be sure to use an extension cord for outdoor use.
- When you are finished grilling, let the coals completely cool before disposing in a metal container.

PROPANE Grills

Check the gas tank hose for leaks before using it for the first time each year. Apply a light soap and water solution to the hose. A propane leak will release bubbles. If your grill has a gas leak, by smell or the soapy bubble test, and there is no flame, turn off both the gas tank and the grill. If the leak stops, get the grill serviced by a professional before using it again. If the leak does not stop, call the fire department. If you smell gas while cooking, immediately get away from the grill and call the fire department. Do not move the grill.

If the flame goes out, turn the grill and before re-lighting it.

SAFETY AROUND THE FIRE

- Avoid burning on windy, dry days. It is easier for open burning to spread out of control when it is windy and dry.
- Watch children while the fire is burning. Never let children or pets play or stand too close to the fire.
- Attend to the campfire at all times. A campfire left alone for only a few minutes can grow into a
- damaging fire. Keep a campfire small which is easier to control.
- Never use gasoline or other flammable or combustible liquids
- Always have a hose, bucket of water, or shovel and dirt or sand nearby to put out the fire. Make sure to put it completely out before leaving the site
- If your clothes catch fire, stop, drop, and roll. Stop, drop to the ground and cover your face with your hands. Roll over and over or back and forth until the
- Treat a burn right away. Cool the burn with cool water for 3 to 5 minutes. Cover with a clean, dry cloth. Get medical help if needed.



If roasting marshmallows, help young children. Never shake a roasting marshmallow. It can turn into a flying, flaming ball. A heated metal skewer can cause burns.

Digs out stumps of trees, and digs out and destroy poisonous vines, weeds and undergrowth. Other duties as requested.






<u>Dover Encourages Use of Web Based "Service Request" Form</u>







